THE HOLY LAND

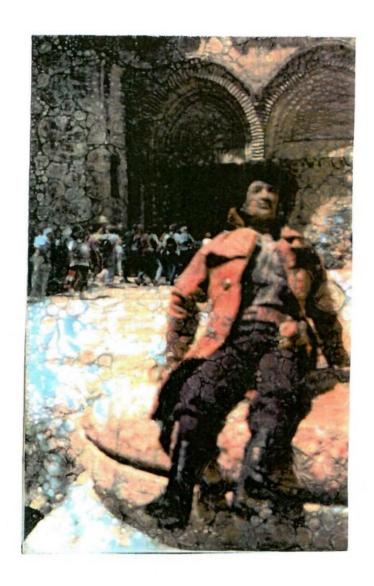

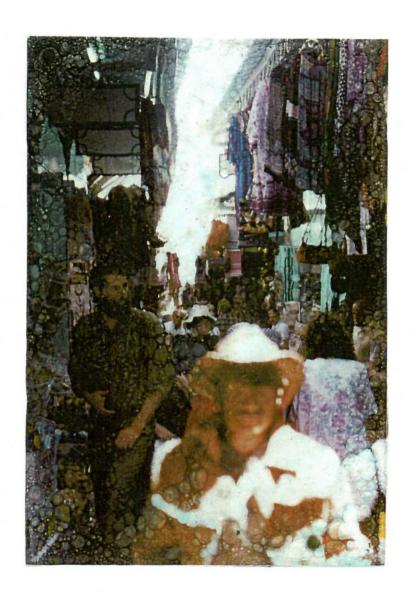
As a character Joe is very significant. He creates new situations to suit his needs. He lives for his ideas, always looking for the next possibility. His concept of place is based on himself.

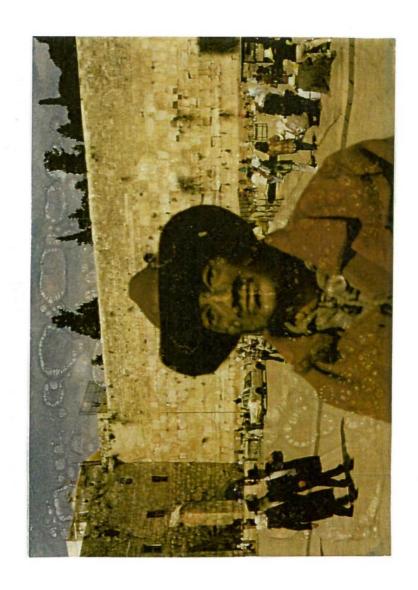

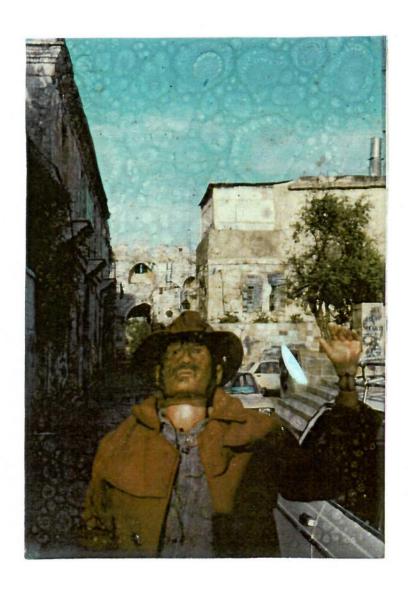
In the photos you will see that some images have a dreamlike quality. This is to create a paradox between what is real and what is fiction in the narrative. All of the events in the photos actually happened.

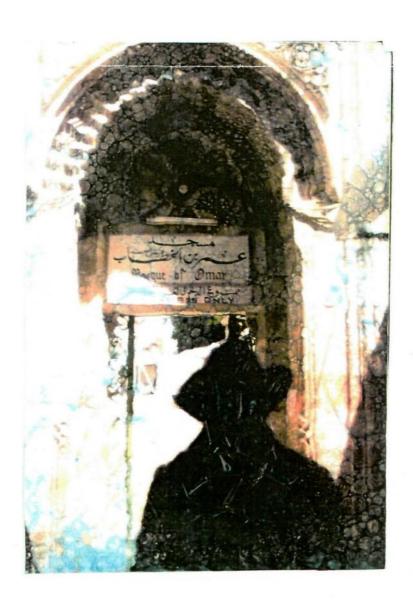
